We've had some planning delays, some funding issues and then COVID, but Maari Ma is now ready to actually achieve a long-held organisational goal: a community-controlled health service in Wilcannia.

Funds have been secured with the help of Regional NSW, the **Indigenous Land and** Sea Corporation, the Commonwealth Department of Health, the NSW Ministry of Health, and Maari Ma's own funds, to construct beside the Darling/Baarka River as per the designs developed by project managers, Troppo Architects, in consultation with Wilcannia staff and community.

Adams joined Executive Operations Officer, Nola Whyman, to hear Cary Duffield from Troppo Architects go over the plans.

Not far from where they're standing there's a trench that was dug to determine if there were any buried Aboriginal heritage artefacts.

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Well known local archaeologist, **Sarah Martin**, had been on the site doing an Aboriginal heritage assessment.

ON SITE INSPECTION

A meeting was held at the site of the new Wilcannia Health and Wellbeing Centre with the builder and architects present.

David Payne Constructions (DPC) from Dubbo is a family-owned business and DPC's Graham Wheeler had a good first look at the site and discussions them, along with local community members, regarding the Centre as well as local employment opportunities.

Local employment on this project is important and it's also a big focus for a number of the project's funding bodies. It not only means local jobs, it's skilling the local workforce, offering on the job training as well as doing courses.

REDI.E, the employment agency in Wilcannia, has already helped a number of people to obtain their Certificate I and Certificate II in construction and to get their NSW White Card - or general construction induction card – which is a requirement for workers who want to carry out construction work.

There were lots of good ideas shared about what we may be able to do regarding availability of construction workers for mentoring younger workers and those who are less experienced.

There's a spectacular Black Box – also called River Box - tree on the site that's going to be kept and incorporated into the centre of the site.

These trees, which are widespread throughout most parts of Australia, were actually used for bush tucker when other seeds were scarce.

Fruiting branches were cut down and placed in the sun to induce the capsules to open. Once the seeds were extracted they were soaked and treated with several changes of water to remove the bitterness.

They were then dried, ground on a grinding stone and eaten.







You can see clearly in the foreground of this photo one of the trenches that was dug to determine if there were any heritage artefacts on the site.

As well as the formalities, there were lots of good informal discussions over lunch between the builder, architects, Maari Ma team and local community members.

Brendon is a proud voung Ku-Ku Yalangii (Cape York) and Woppaburra (North Keppel Island) man.



GP REVIEW

During the year you should see your doctor to see if your GPMP or medication needs to be changed. You may also need some tests.

FOLLOW-UP CARE

Our health workers will visit you to talk about your health and see how you are going with your medications.

MAARI MA CYCLE OF CARE

GPMP & MEDICATION

You will be looked after by our Keeping Well team and other specialists like our dieticians, podiatrists and eye specialists. The Keeping Well team and pharmacist will help you with your medications which could include a Home Medication Review and a Webster Pack.

START

Your cycle of care starts with a twelve monthly CTG/IPIP sign up. This includes ATSI Health Check and a follow up by a health worker.

You should see your doctor regularly and develop a care plan to manage your health. This plan is called a GPMP.
