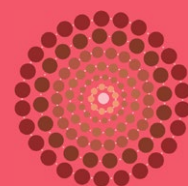

Kiila laana's media officer Sharon Hooker started the educational session by talking to the youths and discussing the effects of smoking and vaping to educate and prevent youths from taking up tobacco use.

Early Years program officer **Leeann Adams** spoke about her journey and the struggles of giving up.

Kids were then handed a shirt that had a tree printed on the front and a blank boxed area on the back along with a texta and asked to place a mark around the tree if someone they know smoked/vaped and on the back of the shirt kids wrote messages about what they think/feel about smoking/vaping.

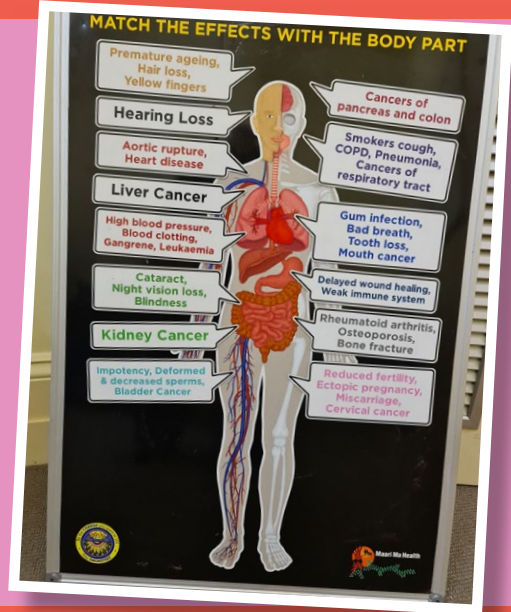
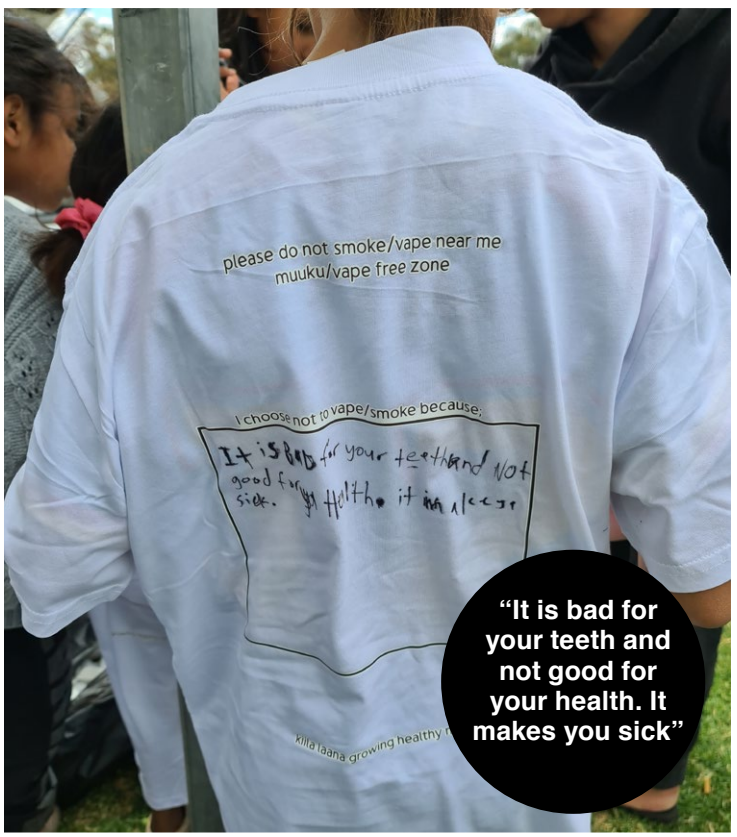
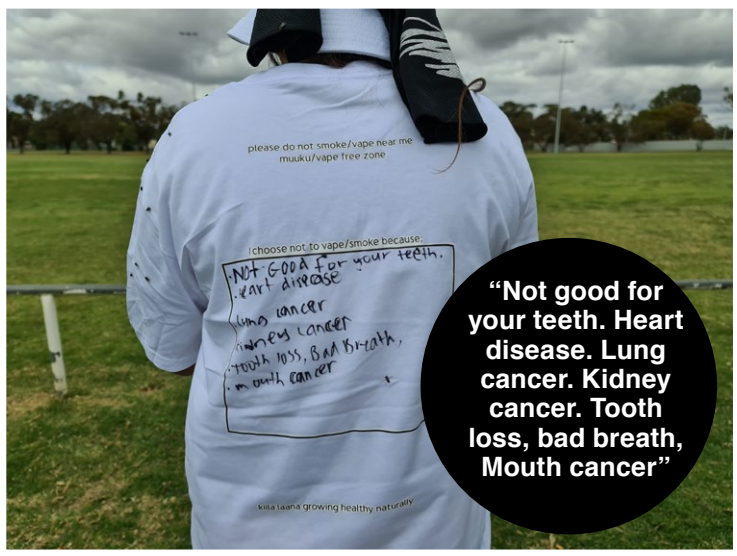

UPDATE ON THE NEW WILCANNIA FACILITY

Good news regarding progress on the new Wilcannia Health and Wellness Centre – Maari Ma now owns the Bonney St land.

Council has requested an easement along the riverfront for a future public walkway which will be a great idea.

There are still some approvals to get before the builder can start construction and we expect these will take several weeks. However in the meantime, a meeting was recently held with the project managers and also the landscape architect in Broken Hill on landscaping issues.

Nola Whyman and **Murray Butcher** attended this meeting and they also looked at large stones in the area which could be used for a yarning circle and elsewhere on the site within the landscaping.

Murray and Nola provided insight into the proposed plants, including Paakintji names and uses, and a subsequent meeting has been held with Broken Hill Landcare which has an established nursery of native plants and is willing to work with the landscaper to propagate sufficient plants for our needs.

We are also excited to be talking to some of Wilcannia's artists about their involvement in the project, as well as Wilcannia's young folk.

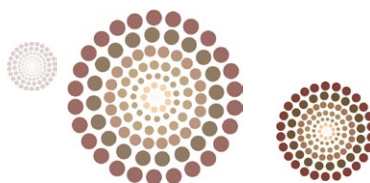
About the role:

This may include maintaining and constructing park facilities; protection of cultural sites; undertaking pest and weed control programs utilizing pesticides, chemicals or firearms; and assisting with fire management activities such as mowing, slashing, grading, and implementing hazard reduction burns and wildfire response.

- You will be relied upon to identify and prioritize maintenance works whilst ensuring they are completed safely and on time. Senior field officers are flexible and organized, and work well in a team environment or alone with minimal supervision. At times you'll be relied upon to also supervise other field staff and contractors. A trade background is beneficial but is not essential.

Have your say on dual naming the Darling River

The Geographical Names Board will be holding an open community forum to gather feedback on a proposal by the Barkindji Native Title Group Aboriginal Corporation to dual name the Darling River as **Baaka**.

The proposed dual name is for the extent of the Darling River, commencing approximately 39km NE of Bourke, winding through Bourke, Wilcannia, Menindee, Pooncarie and Wentworth where it joins the Murray River.

Assigning a place name under the *Geographical Names Act 1966* does not impact other legislation or change rights or responsibilities of the feature. A dual name will sit alongside the non-Aboriginal name, each part having equal status.

Staff from Wings, Early Years and Strong Young Families recently attended a three day training course aimed at understanding how to intervene and provide support for community people at risk of suicide and self harm.



Each staff member participated in role playing and working with different strategies when dealing with people at risk. There was also a discussion

about their own safety and support when dealing with community. Well done to all who did the training – it's not an easy training course to do

but such an important one - helping a person with thoughts of suicide to stay safe and seek further help. Executive Manager Aboriginal Health

GP REVIEW

During the year you should see your doctor to see if your GPMP or medication needs to be changed. You may also need some tests.

START

Your cycle of care starts with a twelve monthly CTG/IPIP sign up. This includes ATSI Health Check and a follow up by a health worker.

FOLLOW-UP CARE

Our health workers will visit you to talk about your health and see how you are going with your medications.

MAARI MA CYCLE OF CARE

GPMP & MEDICATION

You will be looked after by our Keeping Well team and other specialists like our dietitians, podiatrists and eye specialists. The Keeping Well team and pharmacist will help you with your medications which could include a Home Medication Review and a Webster Pack.

You should see your doctor regularly and develop a care plan to manage your health. This plan is called a GPMP.
